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MODEL FOR SIR KEITH PARK STATUE UNVEILED AT CITY HALL

- Sculptor Les Johnson selected from field of seven
- Plan for statue installation on Trafalgar Square's 4th Plinth for 6 months in 2009
- Permanent statue planned for Waterloo Place in September 2010 – 70th anniversary of Battle of Britain
- Plans backed by Mayor of London Boris Johnson
- SKP Campaign to submit detailed planning applications to Westminster City Council before Christmas

The winning design for the proposed statue of New Zealand-born Sir Keith Park, the Battle of Britain hero, was unveiled today at London's City Hall.

The unveiling followed an international competition won by Les Johnson, the leading sculptor, who is currently working on the international slavery memorial statue for Hyde Park. Les Johnson's design was selected from a field of seven by a specially convened group of Campaign supporters. Members included Faith Winter, the sculptor of statues of the RAF's Lord (Hugh) Dowding and Sir Arthur Harris, Terence Stevens-Prior a relative of Sir Keith Park, and opinions were also taken from the members of the Park family based in the United Kingdom and New Zealand.

Mayor of London, Boris Johnson, said:

"I'm delighted to see the winning design of the Sir Keith Park statue unveiled at City Hall and look forward to seeing the full scale statue in place in the heart of the capital. It is fitting that the final design for the statue of Sir Keith Park is unveiled here at City Hall, the centre of government for the capital city he did so much to defend in 1940. Without his courage and leadership, the Battle of Britain would probably have been lost, which would have had devastating consequences for not just London but the entire world."

The unveiling ceremony took place at a breakfast reception in 'London's Living Room' on the 9th Floor of City Hall attended by Deputy Mayor Richard Barnes and Terry Smith, instigator of the Sir Keith Park Memorial Campaign. Battle of Britain veterans, senior RAF officers and high profile supporters of the Campaign such as Edward Fox OBE and Dr Stephen Bungay were present.

Terry Smith said:

"I'm delighted that today we've unveiled this wonderful design by world-renowned sculptor Les Johnson. It's an exciting time for the Campaign. The support for the Campaign has been phenomenal and is still growing, and now we've selected the design, we'll be submitting detailed plans to Westminster City Council. We very much hope the Council will accept our plans so that this great man, who did so much to defend London, Britain and the world from Nazi tyranny, can be properly remembered in the heart of the city he saved."

The Les Johnson design will be used for both the proposed statue to be exhibited temporarily for 6 months on Trafalgar Square's 4th Plinth in 2009, as well as for the proposed permanent memorial statue in Waterloo Place in 2010. The plan is to unveil the permanent memorial to coincide with the 70th anniversary of the Battle of Britain in September 2010.

The Campaign will be submitting detailed planning applications next month to Westminster City Council for both the temporary and permanent memorials.

The temporary statue for the 4th Plinth is likely to be nearly 18ft (6m) tall and the permanent bronze memorial statue for Waterloo Place will be nearer 9ft (3m) tall.

- 1. Air Chief Marshal Sir Keith Rodney Park, GCB, KBE, MC and Bar, DFC, RAF was the New Zealand born RAF Air Vice-Marshal commanding 11 Group Fighter Command, responsible for the aerial defence of London and South East England during the Battle of Britain. His inspirational leadership and tactical brilliance was central to Britain winning the battle, which in turn helped determine the outcome of the entire Second World War. Sir Keith went on to lead the air defence of Malta in 1942, subsequently reaching the rank of Air Chief Marshal in South East Asia at the end of the war. During the First World War, Sir Keith served at Gallipoli and then the Somme before becoming a pilot and shooting down 20 enemy aircraft.
